Gusdal provided energy to squad

Darren Gusdal wasn't a superstar on the 1978-79 Brandon Wheat Kings team, but he brought an energy and personality that turned him into a valued contributor.

Gusdal, who died on June 21, 2014 at the Brandon Palliative Care Centre, grew up in Winnipeg, Brandon and Erickson. While the sports fanatic started hockey at the relatively late age of 10, he quickly made his mark.

"Although many of his friends had skated at a much earlier age, Darren's speed on ice was something that amazed others and that he was extremely proud of," his obituary read. "He played midget hockey in Minnedosa, where he met many of his life-long friends."

He joined the Manitoba Junior Hockey League's Brandon Travellers for the 1977-78 season, contributing 18 goals and 24 assists in 43 games. He also had an assist in a pair of games with the Wheat Kings.

Gusdal earned a spot on the 1978-79, serving primarily as a depth forward and valued penalty killer. In 61 games, he had 11 goals, 12 assists and 52 penalty minutes in 61 games.

He scored in the team's home opener, and had his first two-goal game on Oct. 10, 1978 when he contributed a pair of second-period goals he tallied eight minutes apart. Gusdal had the winning goal in Brandon's 8-2 victory over the Edmonton Oil Kings in the opening round playoff round-robin on March 31, 1979, and two days later, tied the game against Edmonton after Brandon fell behind 2-1. The Wheat Kings ended up winning 4-3.

Head coach Dunc McCalum later said that Gusdal's line had won Brandon two games in a row. Gusdal contributed four goals and six assists in 20 playoff games, and added a goal at the Memorial Cup.

He also spent the 1979-80 season with the Wheat Kings, with 16 goals and 15 assists in 71 games.

After his junior career ended, Gusdal joined the Brandon University Bobcats for three seasons. He was a member of the great 1980-81 team that was the top-ranked Canadian Interuniversity Athletic Union club in the country and attended nationals.

He graduated from BU in 1984 with a bachelor's degree in education and began a teaching career. In 1992, he started managing the Riding Mountain Conference Centre and Camp Wannakumbac.

He was also an active volunteer, participating on the board of directors for the Erickson Credit Union and also a member on the Onanole Community Recreation Centre board.

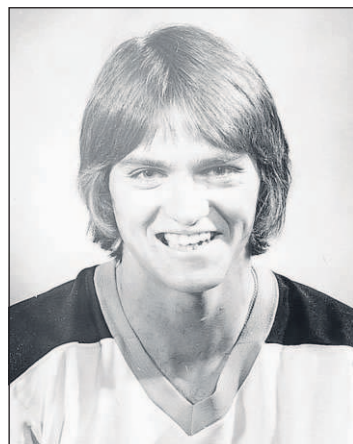
Darren is survived by his wife Janet and two children, Mitchell and Melissa.

BRANT KIESSIG: "Gussy and I were pretty good friends. We spent a lot of time together (as roommates)."

KELLY ELCOMBE: "I was (Darren's) roommate. We boarded at Jack Brockest's

house. He took us both in starting at the same time so he was my roommate for the first year I was there. I can't say enough about Darren Gusdal. Hockey aside, he was just a great guy and a great person, and a hard worker."

BRIAN PROPP: "(Darren) was a younger guy and real quiet but had a great sense of humour and liked to laugh and have fun. He was kind of a role player who was needed."

RICK KNICKLE: "You need those guys to win. Darren was, along with Dave Chartier and Brant Kiessig, penalty killers. He had speed, underrated skill. There were a lot of local guys on that team. He was from Erickson, a lot of local Manitoba small-town guys. He was a real good guy ... Darren left us too soon."

STEPHEN PATRICK: "I remember Gussy as a penalty killer and real intense. He was a real good guy. He lived with Kelly Elcombe. In the dressing room, we were either listening to Willie (Nelson) and Waylon (Jennings) or AC/DC. It was an eight-track and I remember when AC/DC came on that Gussy would play air guitar with his hockey stick. We would all look to him when AC/DC came on — I think the song was 'Gone Shootin'' — and we would egg him on. He was a fast skater and worked really hard, a good penalty killer and a real good guy."

TIM LOCKRIDGE: "Gus was a high-energy guy who was one of our penalty killers. He was just a nice guy. He was a year younger than I was. He was easy going, and he was like a lot of us. He was just happy to be part of it."

MIKE PEROVICH: "(Darren) was a hard worker. He didn't say much and kept to himself but he was a hard worker."

WES COULSON: "Gussy was always happy and always smiling. He was a hard-working kid and he was just a pleasure

to have around. He just always seemed to be happy and nothing seemed to bother him. It's too damn bad what happened to him."

DAVE STEWART: "Gussy could skate. He was a grinder. He was your perfect third-line guy, a John Tonelli type who went, went, went and never stopped. That was Gussy, a good guy."

DON GILLEN: "(I remember) a smile. (Darren) was always there to help. He put the team first. He worked hard, was very satisfied with and happy to be a good teammate. He wasn't selfish, he wasn't self promoting. He was a very good skater, a fast player who scored some big goals. You could trust him and he gave a good effort all he time."

DAVE McDONALD: "(Darren) was a very hard-working individual. There's a good thing there was an end to the boards or otherwise he would still keep on skating. He wasn't the most talented but he worked so hard. He was hyper, very hyper, and for killing penalties and that, he would be excellent. He could get you going before a game. He was more one of these rah-rah-rah guys than anybody else was."

DAVE CHARTIER: "Darren was a good friend, I hated to see him go. He was quick on the ice, and just a workhorse. He went and went and went and never stopped. He could skate like the wind."

KELLY McCRIMMON: "Darren Gusdal was a great skater, a really good penalty killer and a really good guy. He was just a good team guy."

GREGG DRINNAN (Brandon Sun): "He had a funny skating style, great penalty killer. I don't know if he had an off switch. Not many teams in that era on the penalty kill had much puck pursuit but Darren Gusdal would pursue the puck. The other thing I remember is that he was always smiling, and always said hello. In my history with junior hockey players, some of them, and it's true to this day, are titillated by the media and some will walk right by you without speaking to you unless you speak to them first. He was always friendly."

KELLY ELCOMBE: "Darren was just a hardworking, nice, honest, great person. It was a huge tragedy because Darren was a really good guy."

RICK KNICKLE: "(Darren) was an unsung hero on a team with a lot of stars."

 Women — Bridget Carleton, Chatham, Ont., had 18 points as Canada (1-1) defeated South Korea, 74-53.
BEACH VOLLEYBALL
 Women — Melissa Humana-Paredes, Toronto, and Sarah Pavan, Kitchener, Ont., def. the Swiss team of Anouk Freyre-Drepre and Joana Heidrich, 2-0 (21-13, 24-22). They clinched first place in Pool A with a 3-0 record and have yet to lose a set. In a match which determined second place in Pool C (and a playoff berth), Heather Bansley, Waterdown, Ont., and Brandie Wilkerson, Toronto, lost to Agatha Bednarczuk and Eduarda Santos Lisboa of Brazil, 2-0 (21-18, 21-18) and their Games.
