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TRY TO BEAT THAT!: THE 1978-79 BRANDON WHEAT KINGS Brandon sweeps Saskatoon for berth in semis

One year after suffering heartache in the first round of the 1977-78 Western Hockey League playoffs, the Brandon Wheat Kings showed just how completely they had learned their lesson.

That takes us back to the oddest post-season format in league history.


At the time, there were three divisions in the 12team league, the Eastern, Central and Western. The top three clubs in each division played an eight-game round-robin, with a double home and away against the other two top finishers.

The eight games eliminated one team per division, with the two top finishers playing a best-of-seven division final. That provided three division winners, who played a home-and-home series against each other in a four-game round-robin. One of the three teams was eliminated, providing the two league finalists.


Brandon faced the Edmonton Oil Kings and the Saskatoon Blades in the first round-robin.

DON GILLEN: "I really enjoyed spring hockey. I was in better shape and I didn't want to go home. I enjoyed the nicer climate, I enjoyed playoffs that were meaningful. I loved playoff hockey and I still do."

GREGG DRINNAN: "Go-ing into the playoffs, because Dunc (McCallum) took such a business-like approach and treated the players like men, (it was) 'This is our job, playoffs are here, OK guys, we just played 72 games to jet here, let's go.' I don't think there was any talk of the previous year, but guys like Brad McCrimmon weren't going to forget what happened and I'm sure Brad let them know how it happened."

Division and the secondplace Lethbridge Broncos (38-27-7) — the Swift Current Broncos moved there for 12 seasons between 1974 and 1986 before returning to sakatchewan — represent-ed the Central Division after the Billings Bighorns were unexpectedly ousted.

KELLY McCRIMMON: "Pick three worse cities to stick into a round-robin in terms of geography." TIM LOCKRIDGE: "That

round-robin thing made no sense at all but it was what the league wanted to do back then I guess."

The Wheat Kings had outscored the Broncos 31-12 in the regular season, and it was more of the same in the opener in Lethbridge on April 19 as Brandon cruised to a 6-1 victory. The Wheat Kings flew to

Vancouver the next morning and bused to Portland, where the Winter Hawks were waiting for them. What ensued was the worst beating of the year for Brandon as it fell 10-0 to the West Division champs.

WES COULSON: "We weren't very good that night. If I remember right, we bused to Calgary, went down to Lethbridge and beat them in the first game, went back to Calgary, left in the morning, flew to Vancouver and then bused to Portland to play that next game. We came out of the dressing room first and they had 11,000 people in the building, it was jammed to the rafters, and out they came and it was just bedlam. I think we kind of got looking around 'Holy crap, what the hell is going on here?' It was one of those nights when you blink your eyes twice and you're down 4-0. Then they just poured it on and there was nothing we could do. We just couldn't stop the bleeding at all." GREGG DRINNAN: "I don't know if Dunc really had to deliver a message to the guys. I'm sure at that point that guys like Brad and Tim Lockridge would have a message that 'This was just a bad one, we're better than this, let's not let this happen again and get back at it. TIM LOCKRIDGE: "I think we were just dog tired again. I remember that game and we all kind of looked at each other and knew we were a better hockev team than them. I think they were sitting there waiting for us too. It's not like they were travelling the day before. That game to me, I remember it but I think I mentally blocked most of it." STEPHEN PATRICK: "That was an eye-opener.' DAVE STEWART: "You get thrashed. So what? You put it behind you.' GREGG DRINNAN: "I remember Dunc after the game giving the media who was there the upset coach routine and whispering to me later that 'This might be the best thing that ever happened to us. Four days later, with three days of rest and the taste of a terrible beating in their mouths, they pounded Lethbridge 13-3 to knock the Broncos (0-4) out of the playoffs

ROUND-ROBIN NO. 1

On March 29. Brandon won the opener 4-0 in Lloydminster, Alta. — the Oil Kings couldn't get into their building, nor could the Wheat Kings because of the Winter Fair — so they didn't repeat the opening loss from a year ago.

A night later, the unthinkable happened when Saskatoon beat Brandon 5-4 in double overtime on Terry Paskurak's goal. Suddenly Brandon found itself behind Saskatoon in the roundrobin standings, and while it was ahead of Edmonton and thus likely to advance, it was a setup for a team that had only lost five games all season.

COULSON: "We WES went back to Saskatoon and played the next night and we got beat. Now it like 'Holy s— Is this going to happen to us again?' Nobody said anything, that we were going to have a great regular season and then s— the bed in the playoffs again. In the back of my mind I was thinking 'Hmm, we're supposed to win all the games and now we're 1-1?' Then we went back to Edmonton and beat them and then we beat Saskatoon and came home 3-1 after the four road games. We started on the road because of the Manitoba Winter Fair. Once we got into our own building, it was 'No, we're rolling now."

DAVE McDONALD: "We were still confident. We didn't think we weren't going to win the league. That was just our mindset. There was nothing stopping us."

GREGG DRINNAN: "The players had gone through it

when they got to the playoffs in the spring of 1979 that it was more of a case of 'We know what the job is and know what's ahead of us, let's just get it done' and away they went."

How did they respond? The Wheat Kings started another winning streak, earning victories in their next six games to move on, with the Blades joining them.
