Brandon 4, Edmonton 0 Game 1, March 29, 1979

Recap: Brian Propp set the tone with a goal 1:39 into the first period and Dave Chartier added an insurance marker. Goalie Rick Knickle made 28 saves as Brandon made sure not to repeat the mistake it made a year earlier when it dropped its first two games in the round-robin in the 1978 playoffs. The penalty-killing talents of Dave Stewart, Brant Kiessig and Kelly McCrimmon were put to good use, especially when Laurie Boschman took a major in the second period. Edmonton went 0-for-8 with the man advantage.

Saskatoon 5 Brandon 4 (20T) Game 2, March 30, 1979

Recap: Saskatoon forward Terry Paskurak banged in a rebound 16:01 into the second overtime as the Blades made an epic comeback. By the 13:38 mark of the first period, Brandon led 3-0 but Saskatoon scored the next four goals before Don Gillen tied it 4-4. In the second overtime, Saskatoon outshot Brandon 12-2 before notching the winner. Brandon took seven of the nine minor penalties en route to being badly outshot. The loss put the Wheat Kings in an unfamiliar spot in the standings. Saskatoon (2-1-0) was in first place, two points up on Brandon. Darren Gusdal missed the game with a bad groin and Dave Chartier suffered an ankle injury in the second period.

Brandon 8, Edmonton 2 Game 3, March 31, 1979

Recap: Darren Gusdal, Dave Mc-Donald and Don Gillen formed a new line, and Gusdal scored the winning goal after Edmonton had pulled within a goal to trail 2-1. With the Oil Kings keying on the Wheat Kings top line, the production was important. Brandon was without Brad Kempthorne, who sat out the fourth of his five-game suspension.

Brandon 4, Edmonton 3 Game 4, April 2, 1979

Recap: Ray Allison tied the game 1-1 just 62 seconds after Edmonton had taken an early lead, and Darren

Gusdal replied 65 seconds after the Oil Kings took a 2-1 lead. Allison and Brian Propp gave the Wheat Kings a 4-2 lead in the third period that the Oil Kings were unable to overcome.

Brandon 5, Edmonton 3 Game 5, April 3, 1979

Recap: Ray Allison scored 1:40 into the first period as the Wheat Kings booked a spot in the Eastern Division final by eliminating the Oil Kings. The key goal, which made it 4-2, came off Brad McCrimmon's stick early in the third period to restore Brandon's two-goal lead.

BWK goalie: Knickle. Shots on net: 53-38 BWK.

Attendance: 2,455, in Brandon. **Record:** 4-1-0.

Edmonton coach Norm Ferguson: "Brandon's fourth goal— right off the faceoff — hurt us badly. That made it 4-2 and seemed to take a lot out of us."

Brandon 4, Saskatoon 3 Game 6, April 6, 1979

Recap: The Wheat Kings built a 4-0 lead through 40 minutes and hung on for the victory. Brandon's top line didn't see much action beyond the power play. Still, Saskatoon coach Jack McLeod was angry enough at a double minor Brian Propp took in the first period to call the Wheat Kings "a classless organization." With Edmonton already eliminated, the schedule dictated the two teams would face each other three more times in meaningless round-robin games because they already knew they would face each other in the best-of-seven Eastern Division final.

Recap: In a pair of meaningless games to end the round-robin, Saskatoon coach Jack McLeod let everyone know before the last two games began that he was resting seven regulars, hurting Brandon's box office. The Blades called up members of the SJHL's Saskatoon J's to fill out their lineup. Saskatoon actually opened the scoring but trailed 3-2 after the first period and 7-2 after 40 minutes. Ray Allison had a goal and four assists for the victors.

Brandon 13, Saskatoon 1 Game 8, April 8, 1979

Recap: The Wheat Kings scored five goals in the first 15 minutes in the rout. Brant Kiessig and Brad Kempthorne each posted hat tricks and Steve Patrick added four assists as the Wheat Kings outshot the Blades by a three-to-one ratio. Brandon outscored its two opponents 50-19 in the eight-game round-robin. In the Central Division, the secondplace Lethbridge Broncos advanced to meet the third-place Calgary Wranglers and, in the Western Division, the first-place Portland Winter Hawks would play the second-place Victoria Cougars.

Recap: Brandon led 1-0 after 20 minutes before exploding for six unanswered goals in the middle frame. It led 8-0 before the Blades found the back of the net in the third period. Brad Kempthorne picked up his second hat trick in a row, and Dave Stewart added a pair of goals in consecutive games. Brandon was without the injured trio of Dave Chartier, Dave McDonald and Larry Roberts. Wheat Kings goalie Scott Olson was sharp, making 41 saves.

Brandon 6, Saskatoon 4 Game 4, April 14, 1979

Recap: Brandon moved on after building a commanding 5-0 lead in the first period — Brant Kiessig scored the Wheat Kings' first two markers — before the Blades came storming back with four goals in the second. The Blades were sparked by the play of Pat Conacher, who moved back from centre to the blue-line, and Brent Ashton's hat trick. Brandon coach Dunc McCallum replaced netminder Scott Olson with Rick Knickle after the fourth goal. Saskatoon coach Jack McLeod wasn't happy with the work of referee Ian Sandercock, quipping "If that guy is a referee, I'm a tiddlywinks player."

Game 1, April 19, 1979

Recap: The Wheat Kings victimized the Broncos with goals by Ray riod to make it 2-1, but Ray Allison, Allison and Brian Propp 28 seconds apart early in the first period and before the period ended to put the Brandon had all the offence it would game away. Saskatoon was the better need. Allison ended up with a hat trick and Steve Patrick added a pair of goals as Brandon led 6-0 before Lethbridge scored. The hosts played better as the game went on, outshooting Brandon 10-9 in a scoreless third period. Recap: The Winter Hawks and Wheat Kings were scoreless for 14 minutes, but after the first period, Portland led 3-0. The Winter Hawks - they changed to the single word Winterhawks in 2009 — scored three more goals in the second and four in the third period in the kind of beating Brandon handed out so often during the season. Bart Hunter had the 20-save shutout for Portland. It was the first time Brandon was blanked all season.

Record: 1-1-0. Dunc McCallum: "It was complete domination. I realize the kids are tired, but they are not 10 goals tired. I can't recall in four years the guys not going like that. We never won a faceoff, we didn't hit ... we never won anything."

Brandon 13, Lethbridge 3 Game 3, April 24, 1979

Recap: Some nights you lose by 10, some nights you win by 10. Brad McCrimmon and Laurie Boschman scored an incredible six seconds apart just three minutes into the game and the rout was on. In the second period, Brandon forward Brant Kiessig scored two of his three goals 22 seconds apart. Brandon's 13-goal output tied the league record also scored 13 on April 8 against the Saskatoon Blades — matching similar outputs by the 1967-68 Edmonton Oil Kings and 1974-75 Blades. With the win, the Wheat Kings assured themselves a spot in the final against the Winter Hawks.

Brandon trailed 3-1 in the first period and 4-3 in the third period, but defenceman Tim Lockridge's goal with 16 seconds remaining sent the game to extra time. Portland's Clint Malarchuk made 43 saves in the loss. Heading into the league final, Propp was sixth in league playoff scoring with 28 points (10 goals, 18 assists) while Ray Allison was second (15-17—32) and Laurie Boschman was fourth (10-20-30).
